

TRIBAL EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTE

- TEOC Creation: Established in March 2020 in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Expanded its mandate to handle a range of emergency situations
- Comprehensive Disaster
 Preparedness: Beyond pandemic
 response, TEOC plays a key role in
 coordinating emergency preparedness for
 the Tlingit & Haida, communities, and
 region.

TRAINING & COMMUNITY PREPAREDNESS

- All TEOC personnel undergo rigorous training in the National Incident Management System (NIMS) and Incident Command System (ICS) protocols
- The Public Safety Division also sends staff to the Center for Domestic Preparedness for Tribal Training Week annually.
- These programs ensure our teams are fully prepared to handle a wide range of emergencies, aligning with Southeast Conference's emphasis on workforce development as a driver of regional growth.

Community Preparedness:

- We provide Community Emergency Response Training (CERT), Emergency Trauma Technician, CPR/First Aid, Wildland Firefighting, and Naloxone Training to Southeast Alaska communities and Tlingit & Haida citizens.
- This proactive approach strengthens regional resilience and supports economic stability.


TEOC'S RESPONSE TO DISASTERS

COVID-19 PANDEMIC

- Coordinated mass testing
- Distributed Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)
- Managed vaccine distribution to protect communities

Community Preparedness:

 Partnered with local tribes to deliver Conex containers filled with supplies (e.g., light systems, water purification units, shelf stable foods, generator, PPE, etc.)



MISSING PERSONS

Juneau

- The TEOC was key in coordinating search and rescue (SAR) efforts in Juneau, working closely with law enforcement and volunteers.
- The TEOC building was the headquarters for SAR operations, providing a space for family support, community gathering, and SAR team coordination.

Kake

- Similar efforts were organized in Kake, with the TEOC offering both logistical and financial support when other agencies could not extend their resources.
- The TEOC also provided emotional support to families, reflecting our holistic approach to crisis management.

President Joseph R. Biden, Jr. Approves Major Disaster Declaration for the Wrangell Cooperative Association

Release Date: March 16, 2024

WASHINGTON-- FEMA announced that federal disaster assistance has been made available to the Wrangell Cooperative Association to supplement recovery efforts in the areas affected by a severe storm, landslides and mudslides on Nov. 20, 2023.

The President's action makes federal funding available to affected individuals in the Wrangell Cooperative Association. Assistance can include grants for temporary housing and home repairs, low-cost loans to cover uninsured property losses and other programs to help individuals and business owners recover from the effects of the disaster.

Federal funding is also available to the Wrangell Cooperative Association and certain private nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis for emergency protective measures

JUNEAU FLOOD RESPONSE

Using Everbridge Emergency Communication System, we identified 470 tribal citizens (173 households) in the flood zone.

Three-Phased Approach:

- 1. Citizen Safety
- 2. Shelter and Cleanup
- 3. Community Education





JUNEAU FLOOD RESPONSE

Teams worked **16-hour days for 11 consecutive days**, and the state allocated **20 National Guardsmen** under TEOC command. We provided shelter, distributed over 500 meals, and ensured **all citizens**—tribal or non-tribal—received the necessary support.
