FHWA'S APPROACH TO BIL IMPLEMENTATION

- High points of BIL highway provisions
- Emphasis on broad, inclusive opportunity
- Funding available to a range of recipients
- Proactive outreach strategy

Note: Amounts shown in this document do not reflect funding subject to appropriation.

High points of BIL highway provisions

- **Funds highway programs for five years** (FY 22-26)
- **\$350.8 B (FY 22-26) for highway programs**
 - \$303.5 B in Contract Authority (CA) from the Highway Trust Fund (HTF)
 - +\$47.3 B in advance appropriations from the General Fund (GF)
- **More than a dozen new highway programs**, including—
 - **Formula:** resilience, carbon reduction, bridges and electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure
 - **Discretionary:** bridges, EV charging infrastructure, rural projects, resilience, wildlife crossings, and reconnecting communities
- Focus on safety, bridges, climate change, resilience, and project delivery
- **More opportunities for local governments and other non-traditional entities** to access new funding
- \$90 B transfer (GF->HTF), which will **keep the HTF Highway Account solvent for years**

** PA = a special purpose district or public authority with a transportation function; FLMA = Federal Land Management Agency

***May be eligible if partnered with an eligible entity, or under other specific conditions. For example, territories can apply for PROTECT at-risk coastal infrastructure grants [23 USC 176(d)(4)(C)]. See program information sources for more details.

Emphasis on broad, inclusive opportunity

- BIL has expanded funding opportunities (at scale) to a wider range of entities. Eligible entities now include:
 - States, Washington D.C., Puerto Rico, and territories
 - Localities
 - Metropolitan planning organizations
 - Tribes
 - Federal Land Management agencies
 - Others, depending on the discretionary program
- FHWA is committed to supporting these entities as they apply for (and benefit from) BIL funding

Proactive outreach strategy

- BIL briefings for a range of audiences
 - Support for “BIL 101” sessions for States/locals led by the Secretary’s office
 - Leadership remarks/presentations in various settings
 - Division Office presentations to stakeholder groups
- Emphasis on technical assistance and local support
 - Technical assistance from Federal-aid and Federal-lands Division offices
 - Release of guidance, Fact Sheets, frequently asked questions, program websites
 - ROUTES program
 - Specific technical assistance opportunities within designated discretionary programs

Overview of Highway Provisions

[Division J]

[NEW] National Electric Vehicle Formula Program (formula and discretionary*)

Purpose	Strategically deploy electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure and establish an interconnected network to facilitate data collection, access, and reliability
Funding	\$5 B (FY 22-26) in advance appropriations from the GF
Recipients	States (including DC and Puerto Rico)
Distribution formula	Same shares as Federal-aid highway apportionments
Other key provisions	- Funded projects must be located along designated alt fuel corridors - Sets aside 10% of funding for discretionary grants to State and local

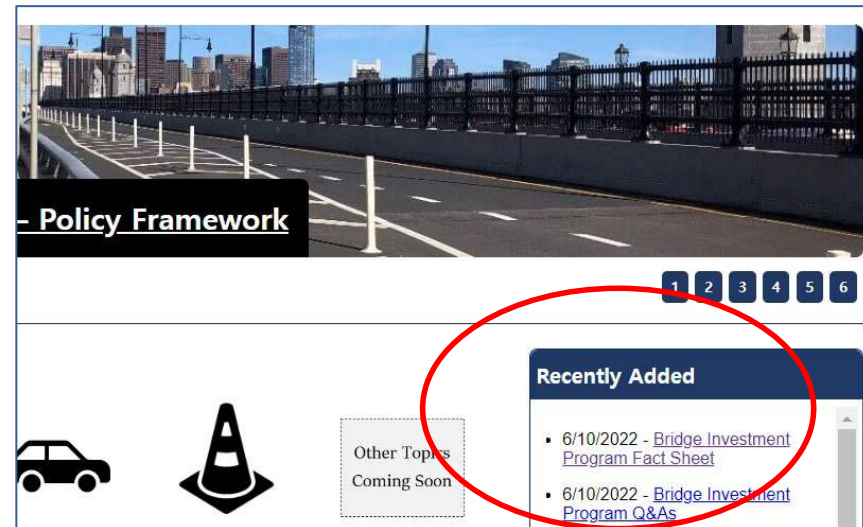

Other Safety-related Provisions

Program/topic	Provisions in the new law
Increasing Safe and Accessible Transportation Options (§11206)	- Defines Complete Streets standards and policies - Requires each State and MPO to carry out transportation planning activities related to complete streets or multimodal travel using— - State: at least 2.5% of its State Planning and Research (SPR) funds - MPO: at least 2.5% of its Metropolitan Planning (PL) funds
Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) (§§11129, 11135)	- Adds to MUTCD purposes inclusion and mobility for all users - Requires MUTCD update within 18 months, every 4 years thereafter - Requires first update to provide for protection of vulnerable road users to the greatest extent possible, among other specified elements

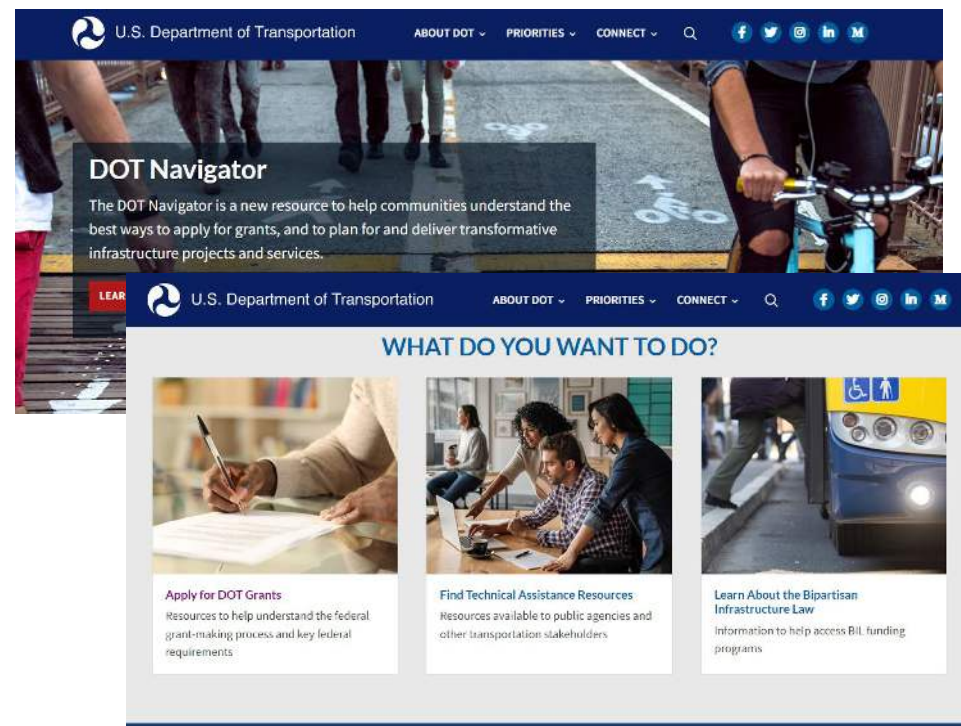

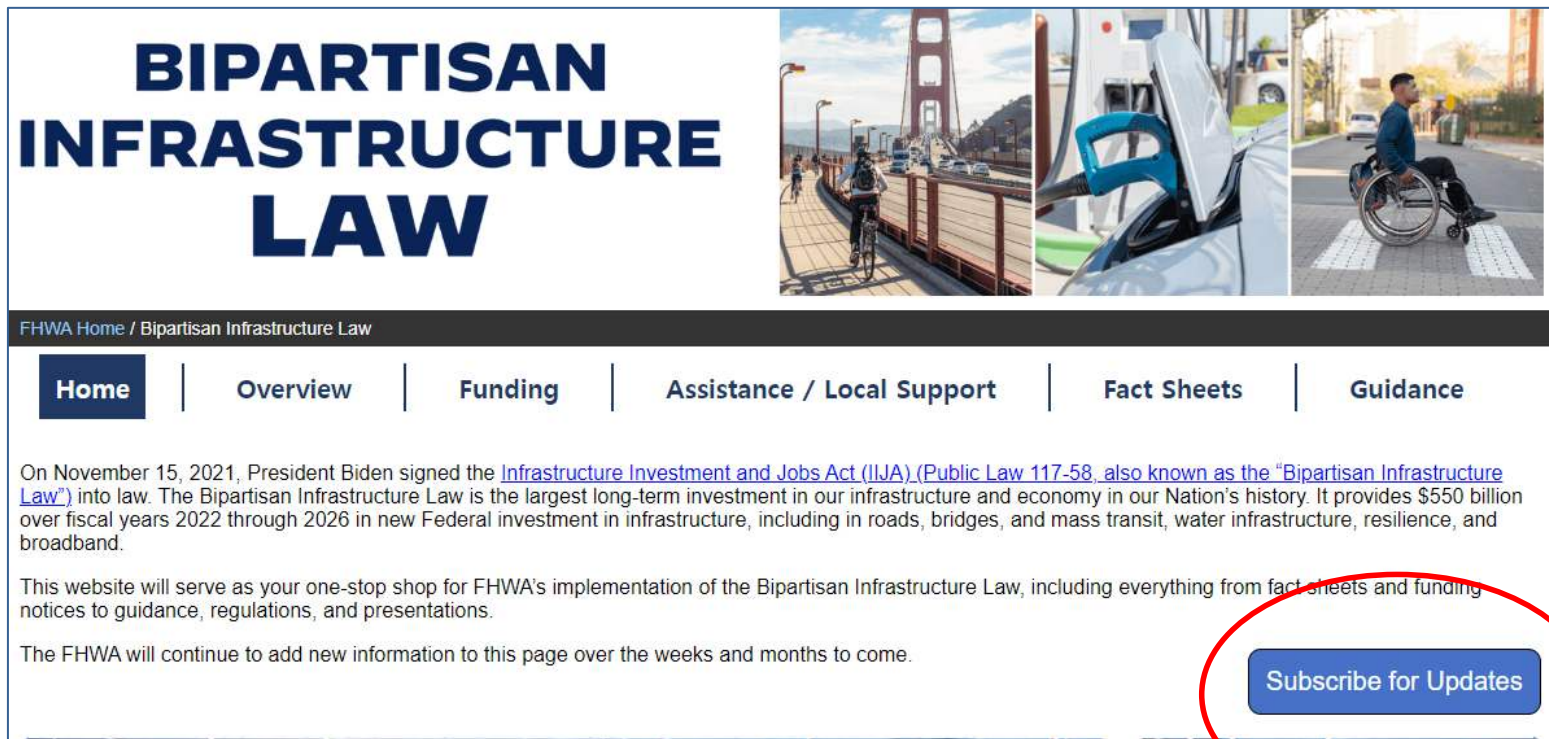

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On November 15, 2021, President Biden signed the [Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act \(IIJA\)](#) (Public Law 117-58, also known as the "Bipartisan Infrastructure Law") into law. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law is the largest long-term investment in our infrastructure and economy in our Nation's history.
